## Grammar

*Q: When can I use "and" at the beginning of a sentence or a paragraph?*

A: You should avoid using FANBOYS at the beginning of a sentence in academic writing. Use a conjunctive adverb such as "also", "however", or "therefore" instead. You can use FANBOYS at the beginning when you're speaking or writing a direct quotation. Here are some examples to illustrate this:

- Conversational: And you should talk to Daryl if you're taking a semester vacation.

- Academic: Also, you should talk to Daryl if you're taking a semester vacation.

Notice that the Quote of the Week is also an example of this guideline and when to break it.

## Manners and Culture

*Q: Why do Americans ignore grammar rules when speaking?*

A: Nearly everyone does, to some extent. This is how we create slang and idiom and how language evolves over time. Language is not a static, unchanging thing. It lives because it's spoken by a nearly infinite variety of people with a nearly infinite variety of thoughts and ideas. Think about it. When you speak in your native language with your friends, does it sound exactly like the language you are formally taught in school? Does it sound like the exact same language that your grandparents or even your parents use when they speak to their friends? My motto is, learn the rules and then learn how to break them, so you can sound more like a native speaker!
